Dearest CBS.

"Thank you for your service."

I thought it was a joke. I pictured him saluting me like I just returned home from war, American flags waving and "The Star-Spangled Banner" playing in the background. Thank you for your service? What am I, a veteran? But when my senses returned, I realized the weight of what he had meant. A role that I thought was "nothing much" was just as valuable and pleasing in God's eyes as any other position within the fellowship. A role that I thought wasn't "spiritual" was one of many ways that God poured His Spirit into the fellowship for His own glory. In other words, serving in a seemingly insignificant way held more power and meaning than I had thought.

CBS, this year I have witnessed that power and meaning of service to such an extent that I am moved to simply thank God for how He has built up this fellowship.

So many of you have risen up to serve in small groups, Bible studies, worship, fellowship dinners, prayer partnerships, and much more. You have intentionally met up with each other, sympathized with each other, and prayed for each other. You have taken on the task of being role models for those both younger and older than you, so that we may mutually uplift one another to look more like Christ. Aren't all of these beautiful ways of serving your fellowship and your God? Aren't all of these evidence that God has used your words, actions, and time to be His working hands and feet? In case you haven't already heard it, let me say it to you now: you have served well. Thank you for your service.

Now, if you're reading this and think you haven't served either as much as you would have liked to or at all, remember my first point: however big or small you think your acts of service are, they matter and have power. So be careful not to fall into the trap of comparison; instead, dwell on the fact that God has given each person gifts and abilities according to His good measure and will give you His Spirit to use those gifts for His good purposes (1 Corinthians 12). Be intentional about seeking out these opportunities to serve, knowing that fixing your eyes on Christ is always the first step when it comes to running the race of faith (Hebrews 12). Be bold in living for Christ, ask for His Holy Spirit to equip you, and serve well. God, who called you to be His child and servant, is faithful; He will mature you as you pursue Him (1 Thessalonians 5:23-24).

I say all of these things because I have had the privilege to both *serve in* and *be served by* this fellowship and want to exhort you to take advantage of the opportunities to serve in and be served by whichever body of believers you are in next year. Serving with CBS has strengthened my faith, taught me to rely on God more than myself, and brought unexplainable joy in my heart.

But just the same, being served by brothers and sisters in CBS has been uplifting and most necessary, even (no, especially) as one of the coordinators. Indeed, each time this year that I would receive a word of encouragement, a note of gratitude, a sign of trust, or a genuine prayer from one of you, I was overwhelmed with thankfulness and relief. I read their words and I hear the unspoken hardships that they went through, the severe doubts that they had in all that they did, the hard moments of brokenness that they experienced to pave the way for love. One of the past coordinators has said that if he was able to redo his coordinatorship, he would redo it, and in an entirely different way. And after all this time, I understand him well. Many things under my time as a co-coordinator have come, of which some have stayed, and some have gone: initiatives, beliefs, feelings...even people. Some of the things I have said, done, and thought I deeply regret, and some of the more pleasant things I did I wish I had done more of. What a wonderful ellipse to sum up my feelings as a co-coordinator: "If I could do it all over again..."

But would I really take up the opportunity to do it all again? If I was asked this around the end of the fall semester, I wouldn't have hesitated to say yes. More recently, however, I have felt a deep pang of pride inside of me swell whenever my heart tries to affirm its yes to that offer.

For I am a perfectionist, and I want the work that I am responsible for to be done perfectly the first time. And if I'm being really honest with myself, not only do I want it to be done perfectly the first time, but I want ME to be the one who does it perfectly the first time. And thus, I have felt strong feelings of guilt in wanting the option to start all over. The wicked seed of self is terribly rooted in me, and it runs deep and widespread.

In many instances, don't we all feel the same? Don't we all want to be the one holding the flag at the end of the battle, victorious? Don't we all want, in our selfish urges, to be the one who triumphs and rallies the crowd together? Certainly we don't want to be remembered as the leader who cried silently in the corner, out of the sight of others, or the leader who just simply didn't do enough for his or her followers. We, in the most human way possible, enjoy self-made success and words of affirmation that accompany it. We simply want all the glory. I know I do.

At the very end of his life, one of the founders of the Methodist Church George Whitfield uttered his famous words, "Let me die and let my name die with me." Many of us may not know who George Whitfield is, but I can guarantee that as a prominent figure of America's Great Awakening, we have certainly felt the lasting, God-fearing and God-loving impact of his ministry. I long for a tenth of his heart. I wish for my name to vanish, and for my presence to remain no longer, but for the Lord's ministry to remain, and to be strengthened and protected, emboldened by the truth. I wish, as George Whitfield once proclaimed, to let my pride die, but to let "Christ be glorified."

Do you know who wrote the words to the hymn "Jesus Loves Me"? It was Anna Bartlett Warner, and she wrote it into one of her sister's novels during the mid-19th century. In the novel, someone had to comfort a dying child, and sung the words to the tune that we all know today. How many countless children's hearts has Christ touched, and how many souls have been saved, through Anna's desire to center everything around Christ?

Jesus loves me. How He loves me so.

What is hardship, if not God's loving hand guiding me towards His mercy? And what is suffering, if not God's gentle reminder of His love which transcends all things?

What if God's silence towards a matter, however painfully long it may look like, is not silence at all? What if His timing really is perfect? What would happen if I truly lived out the Proverb of trusting in Him in all things instead of leaning on my own understanding?

"What if I care, because He cares?" So wrote CBS alum Faith on her *Keeping Heart* blog.

Amen. He has always cared.

"Surely He doesn't love me now," I often tell myself in confession. "I shall repent, yet He shall reject me still."

"Never," He tells me back, embracing me with as tight a squeeze as how I like to imagine the father squeezed when he hugged his prodigal son. "I shall never let you go. I shall call you by your name, for you are mine."

I am thankful for all the mistakes that God has so lovingly corrected me on during my time as a cocoordinator. I am overjoyed by how much God has done so much for me, for STEAM, for the Bible study leaders and the small group leaders, for the ministry members and the prayer partners, the treasurer and the BoL editor, the fellowship, the pastors and the newcomers, all without my hand. I am grateful to God for the countless number of alumni who loved me so dearly when I was young and eager, who obediently displayed Christ's love in a quiet, undying manner, who planted seeds in me through the power of the Word and the Spirit to produce flowers that have now begun to blossom, who looked at the Lord's promises by faith and waved at them from afar, as well as the alumni who came before them and did the same unto them, and the forgotten ones before them whom God has not forgotten. And I am blessed by God for my fellow coordinator and all of her fervent prayers, the ones prayed with me and the ones prayed for me.

Amen, Lord. Amen. Every bit of it was necessary, and testifies so clearly to me now to your sovereignty. Not a single instance was in vain. Continue to work without me, so that you may receive every bit of the glory.

Lord, thank you for all the accidents, mishaps, and failures that were prevented by you beforehand, as well as the ones that did occur and were used by you to humble me mightily. Lord, thank you for caring for and loving those whom I couldn't care for, and for going out of your way to find the lost sheep. Lord, thank you for showing me one at a time every step of the way, but not the next three steps, lest I forget to place my faith in You. Lord, thank you for the knowledge of the Word and the truth, that Christ has died, Christ has risen, Christ will come again. How sweeter do these truths taste the further I walk down the narrow road.

Dear CBS,

We tackled two challenging books this semester: Habakkuk and Micah. At times, the minor prophets blend together in our minds – aren't they all talking about the same thing? While some of the sentiments expressed in these books may be similar, our in-depth study into these two books have revealed so many beautiful truths about the character of God as well as provided insights into how we should form our relationship with the Lord.

In these times, Habakkuk is frustrated by the actions of Israel, and his complaint to the Lord shows us his trust in the Lord – he is fully willing to take his petition to the Lord instead of relying on his own knowledge. However, we must wait, watch, and trust that God is in control of all things. We can also relate to Habakkuk in the sense that God's plans are often confusing to our limited human minds. The Lord will not change His will due to the whims of man. Instead, he is carefully orchestrating everything and we must have faith in His wisdom

Habakkuk also taught us that faith is not rooted in favorable circumstances. Faith is not necessarily a picture of perfection either, given that Habakkuk was distraught over the fate of Israel while still trusting God. Instead, faith is our hope that in our darkest hours the Lord will help us and triumph over all. Our God is loving and merciful and we must remember that our security does not lie in external, worldly events. Rather, we must wait for God's timing and give Him our full reliance and trust.

Although set in a different time period, the book of Micah reflects a similar message to that of Habakkuk, painting God's judgment as well as forgiveness. Micah threatens Israel and Judah that they will face punishment and destruction in the hands of a just God if they do not repent of their sins. If they do, he promises God's grace and blessings upon them.

Micah continually reminds us of the wickedness of humanity and the wrath of a righteous and holy God. However, he does not keep us in fear but inspires hope by prophesying a savior who will redeem us from eternal darkness.

When all else fades away, we can always be sure of God's faithfulness to us. He is a God that was faithful to the Israelites generations ago and is a God that is faithful to us in the present and generations to come. We must always remember His steadfast love and continue to "act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with Him" (Micah 6:8).

Dear CBS,

This semester, we looked at two seemingly hard-toread texts in the Old Testament: Habakkuk and Micah. Now this might seem a little strange at first glance: why would anyone want to read something from the Old Testament? One might believe that the Old Testament is less applicable to college students than the New Testament, since the Old always talks about God's judgment on His people while the New always talks about Christ and ways for us to live for Him. Not to mention the fact that CBS, for the past couple of years, has enjoyed studying the epistles, so it might have felt weird this semester to stray away from the conventional reading that CBS attends to. Even more so, out of all the Old Testament books, we were tasked with reading two little books called Habakkuk and Micah. But why were we tasked with reading Habakkuk and Micah? What kind of co-coordinator who leads Bible pre-study would advocate for these books instead of more favored, cherished titles, like Genesis, Exodus or 1st and 2nd Samuel? Hmm.

Nevertheless, the Bible studies in Habakkuk and Micah persisted. And from our discussions and deep dives into these texts, we were able to see not only clear, continuous evidence of our Lord's love within our passages, but also evidence of God's undying faithfulness to His people. In Habakkuk, we learned about the coming destruction of Israel brought about by the Babylonians. And even with this prophecy, the Lord declares that He will wipe the Babylonians, and that His people shall remain (Habakkuk 2). And in the later chapters of Micah, we hear promises of Christ's coming - a "Shepherd-King" who will come to rule and of the future beyond Israel's suffering caused by the Assyrians. What exactly is entailed in this future? A future where men build each other up, going together to the highest temple of the Lord to worship the Holy one (Micah 4). Wow.

Praise God for giving us the opportunity every week to gather and grow spiritually closer to one another as we study His Word.

To conclude, here are two of our favorite verses that we discussed in Bible Study. As this semester draws to a close and many of us prepare to enter a new chapter in our lives, it is our prayer that we are all able to keep these verses close to our hearts, to remember that God's overwhelming love and faithfulness to us always gives us reason to rejoice, especially when it seems that nothing is going right.

Dear CBS,

10. If you could meet up with your younger self who is just about to start their new life at Cornell, what is one piece of advice or encouragement that you would tell them?


Oof...I would tell little Meili that she is a child of God. And she doesn't have to be scared to approach others and also God in her imperfection. Ah, little Meimei.


Another thing I would say is don't worry too much about your own plan for college or your own plan for after college because God might change it. And if or when you do, it will be better than what you could have imagined.

10. If you could meet up with your younger self who is just about to start their new life at Cornell, what is one piece of advice or encouragement that you would tell them?



10. If you could meet up with your younger self who is just about to start their new life at Cornell, what is one piece of advice or encouragement that you would tell them?


I would say don't take everything too seriously. Every day's a new day. Be prepared for COVID.



10. If you could meet up with your younger self who is just about to start their new life at Cornell, what is one piece of advice or encouragement that you would tell them?



10. If you could meet up with your younger self who is just about to start their new life at Cornell, what is one piece of advice or encouragement that you would tell them?



10. If you could meet up with your younger self who is just about to start their new life at Cornell, what is one piece of advice or encouragement that you would tell them?


Oh this was pre-Covid...hmm...even though life will take you in many different turns throughout these four years, just remember to hold on to your faith and your friends.



- 3) caring


[All very good to have in a physical therapist!] True!

Martin Luther on Sinning Boldly and Having the Feels

Here are two reflections that I found deeply challenging yet helpful in my walk with Christ during college. Perhaps they could lend some help to you too as you walk down the narrow road.

Martin Luther on Sinning Boldly

Martin Luther has two quotes that speak rather controversially about the Gospel. The first quote has been famously paraphrased as: "Be a sinner, and sin boldly, but let your trust in Christ be bolder." When I first heard this quote, a couple of guardrails popped up in my head and I got all defensive, and I hope that you as well, upon first glance, had some kind of visceral, gut-wrenching feeling of offense come out of you. For, as Christians, shouldn't our entire mission be focused on running away from sin? Shouldn't we strive not to be sinners?

And the answer to these questions is absolutely yes. Romans 6 tells us very explicitly, "Therefore do not let sin reign in your mortal body so that you obey its evil desires." So God declares sin as evil, and commands us to rid ourselves of every instance of it. Still, this doesn't help explain what Luther was trying to say when he said to be a sinner. It took reading a lot of commentaries for me to comprehend what Luther was trying to prove, and I realized after some time that it was Luther's use of the word "boldly" that bothered me the most. Perhaps in this day and age, we interpret someone who acts boldly as someone who acts with prideful intent, and the thought of Luther telling others to sin scares me enormously. But Luther may have defined boldness instead as the quality of having a strong or clear appearance. Thus, the word boldly means to emphasize the striking degree of the self-awareness one should have towards their own condition. To "be a sinner" and to "sin boldly" is not a call for us to relish in our evil, but rather a call for us to firmly identify our state of sin and acknowledge the sin which we have committed against God. The question, then, turns from whether we should be "sinning boldly" or not to why it is important that we acknowledge our sin in the first place.

Time and time again, secular thought pressures us to believe that everyone, deep down, is a good person. According to popular secular thinking, Christianity at best functions as a self-help tool that helps people achieve their "greatest self" or fulfill their "deepest desires." Yet, if we choose to believe that all humans are at their core really good, we are culpable for diminishing the glory of Christ and the saving power of the cross. The Bible tells us that "sin entered the world through one man" (Romans 5:12) – that we are, in reality, sinful at our core - and that we deserve death because of our sin (Romans 6:23). As we grow in understanding of our flesh and sinfulness, the more we will realize how impossible it is for us to earn our salvation (Psalm 130:3). And the more we learn about the degree to which sin separates us from God, the more beautiful the redemptive power of the cross becomes, the sweeter our salvation tastes, and the more our heart rejoices in thankfulness (Psalm 130:4).

On the contrary, the more we neglect our sinful state, the more we are prone to question the purpose of Christ and miss the significance of our salvation. For why would any of us need saving if we were already good to begin with? In Mark 2:13, Jesus said that "those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick. I came not to call the righteous, but sinners.'" When we declare ourselves to be sinless, Christ can no longer act as our savior, and the case for Christianity is devastated.

Just by the act of confessing and repenting of our sins, the power of the cross is placed into a far greater emphasis than without. For Jesus did not come down from Heaven to die on the cross so that we could go from being good people to better people – no, but while we were still dead in our sins, He died and rose again to bring us from death into eternal life. He paid for the heavy price of our sins on the cross, and freely gave our undeserving souls life: "But the *gift* of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 6:24).

Yes, Martin Luther was probably not as clear as he could have been when discussing our sinfulness, since this quote has stirred up (and continues to stir up) a lot of moments of confusion within me. Moreover, we should be extremely cautious whenever

we use this quote if we ever are to discuss it with others (The Gospel Coalition makes note that Luther never mentioned such a strong of a statement to layfolk in his preaching). Placing all this aside, the point remains clear when carefully placed in the context of Christ. Only through Christ are we, after confessing our sins and declaring Jesus' lordship and victory over death, simultaneously able to be removed from the penalty of sin and also strive to remove sin's presence from our lives. As a famous pastor once said, "for every look at yourself, take ten looks at Christ." Amen, and may we be sure to look at ourselves, growing in awareness of our depravity lest we misunderstand our placement in this world and ultimately undervalue the depth of Christ's redeeming work.

Martin Luther on Having the Feels

The second Martin Luther quote that I wanted to mention is such: "You should not believe your conscience and your feelings more than the Word which the Lord who receives sinners preaches to you." As Christians, we are bound to go through seasons of doubt - it is inevitable. "Am I really a Christian?" and "Does God really love me?" are just some of the questions that sneak their way into my head throughout the year. Sometimes they come from a heart full of uncertainty and worry, and other times they come from a heart burdened by the guilt and shame felt from sin. When these questions are asked, I start to doubt the faith that I have, guestion what it means to have faith, and then worry over whether I even had a faith to begin with. And it leads me to experience times of intense worry and itch feelings of self-pity - times and feelings that I know too well.

And yet, through the marvelous assurance of salvation found in the Word, I can still write to you with full confidence that we are freed. By Christ's redemptive work and the power of the Holy Bible, we are *freed* of any doubts, worries, and any other emotion that distracts us from the power of Christ's love. In Romans 10:8-9, Paul addresses the difference between the righteous who live by the law as opposed to the righteous who live by faith, preaching,

"But what does it say? 'The word is near you; it is in your mouth and in your heart,' that is, the word of faith we are proclaiming: That if you confess with your mouth, 'Jesus is Lord,' and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved."


Within these verses, Paul states the means by which we are saved, that is, our belief that "Jesus is Lord" and that "God raised Him from the dead," and also the means by which we can know for this to be true, which is the Word that is "near us" and in our "mouths" and our "hearts." Sometimes, there is a tendency to focus so much on the source of our salvation that our act of focusing itself becomes the driving force behind our confidence in Christ: the "strength" of our believing assures our faith more than the real source of the truth. During times of difficulty, it can be so easy to get wrapped up in emotion and question everything when our faith is supported by our feelings and not the truths of the Bible. If only we had the wisdom to get out of our heads and read directly from the Word, so that the wrestling would fade away and the message become clear as day. Jesus loves me, this I know - for the Bible tells me so.

Tim Keller has a great Jonah sermon about what it means to have faith. Speaking on Jonah's prayer in Jonah 2, Keller outlines the first step of faith as "doubting your doubts." There's a particular moment when Keller declares, "why should your mistrust and your cynicism be exempt from your doubts? Or in other words, why should you be cynical and doubt everything in your life except your own cynicism and doubts?" It's a great sermon quote that has stuck with me for a while. Every time I fall into the pattern of cynicism and doubt, I am reminded by Keller of how much I want to trust myself before I trust God: how much I want to be sure of my own judgment first before trusting what God has declared for certain. And what God has declared for certain is simply thus: that if we believe, then we are saved. Oh, how I always make things difficult. How I wish I ran to the Word first instead of my own thoughts.

So, dear reader, it is not wrong to be in the feels. For many in the Word cried out to God in fear and anguish: Job, David, and Isaiah, to name a few. Yes, feelings can be affirming, and they are not inherently sinful as well. But they are not where we should ground our faith, nor what we should dwell on for too long. May we always build our faith upon the solid rock of the Word instead of the sinking sand of fleeting human emotions.


